Hi Family,

Attached are some photos, and I don't know if the captions show on the small screen, so I will describe them: First, two that Steve suggested: (1) 1902: Frank and Amy Lindgren on their wedding day, and (2) 2005: Aunt Irene and Les Dahlen shortly after their marriage (2nd for both). Then, from me, is (3) 1923: The four Frank and Amy Lindgren girls: Aunt Irene at age 6 (spunky even then) with her three older sisters, Ruth, Ev, and Gene. Becky sent a cute collage of four photos of her grandson Roman getting his long hair cut, but I could not figure out how to attach it here, so will forward it separately as Round Robin, Part 2, along with a repeat of her letter.

Also attached is a "pdf" document from our double-cousin and newest member, Jim Carey. It is a genealogy table, still in draft form, showing the relationships of our extended family members. Jim is still working on it and welcomes input from us. It puts the relatives into an orderly and easy-to-read visual form – extremely helpful! Aunt Irene would have loved it. My youngest nephews, Jon and Julia's boys (Alexander and Alek), have just had birthdays. They all live in the virus "epicenter" in New Rochelle NY. Julia sent me this note a couple of weeks ago which summarizes it for many of us:

"I hope you are doing well in this 'new normal.' It's been quite an adjustment, and I don't like it at all. I'm grateful that I can still work (from home) and that it's busy enough to keep me occupied most of the day. Thank you for remembering the boys. I cannot believe they will be 16 and 18 next week. How did THAT happen? ... Not sure how we'll celebrate; likely just a cake -- perhaps a special treat of ordering dinner in instead of cooking.... Please do keep yourself safe, and know that we are all thinking about you."

We have a new Round Robin member, Jim Carey from California, professor of entomology at the University of California, Davis (in northern California, near Sacramento). His name was on the last Round Robin list, but he is writing to introduce himself in person this time. He is our "double-cousin," son of LaVerna Lindgren and Robert Carey, and grandson of Grandma Amy's sister Lizzie and Grandpa Frank's brother John. (I used to call them "Grandma and Grandpa Lindgren" growing up, but this would be confusing today – can mean several people.)

A year ago Jim was in Madison WI for a presentation and met the three Obed sons – Steve, Bruce and Dave – and Gil's Dick, plus Laura and Carson. They suggested he join the Round Robin group, and write an entry at this time. There has been a flurry of emails between Jim and myself over the last couple of weeks and he is full of enthusiasm – I imagine him as the ideal college professor,

accomplished but sympathetic on the human level. Genealogy is one of his fields of interest.

He has included a summary of his life to introduce himself. I added some headings to make it easier to read. We have been exchanging lots of emails, and he told me this little story about himself the other day: He mentioned that when he first moved to California 45 years ago, he met sisters Pauline and Rosalie Johnson (daughters of Grandma Amy's brother "Frank I." and Esther Carlson). As adults, the girls had made the adventurous decision to move to Sacramento CA and open a Swedish "tea room" restaurant. Of course they were older when Jim met them. Jim said:

"Rosalie and Pauline's tea room was called the Orange Horse (named after the Swedish icon, the Dala horse), located at the time in the upscale Town & Country Mall in Sacramento. I believe I visited it once. They and Rosalie's family came to my son's christening in 1980 but I really didn't see them much. I went to Rosalie's husband Don Ortmeyer's memorial after he died 10-15 years later. Pauline thought I should hook up with Rosalie's daughter Gwendolyn, who had graduated from Berkeley as I recall, but was much younger. Aside from the cousinship issue, at that time I was not that far-removed from Iowa's corn fields and she was cosmopolitan young woman – not good fit! She's gone on to do well back east."

Interesting. I love Swedish tea rooms, by the way. I have come across them in several cities. Love those little pastries. But I digress. Welcome, Jim Carey!

Jim has two links in his entry: one is to a very short presentation about using genealogy tables, with good diagrams clarifying and naming the relationships between relatives. The second link is more casual, a travelogue of the trips to Africa that Jim and his wife Patty have taken. It is pretty fast moving in parts – if you want to pause it, just hit the ""k" button on your keyboard. Set aside some time to sit and enjoy this – it is 45 minutes long.

The Africa video starts with gorillas in the wild, and Jim got so close, I can't imagine why these beautiful creatures didn't just turn around and take a swing at him! But I guess I have seen too many King Kong/Jurassic Park-type movies. And the humans were being very quiet and careful. There are other animals, gorgeous scenery, and then a section about the people living in the small villages, very interesting and respectful of them I thought. As noted above, there is also an expanded "pdf" file on genealogy. So – enjoy!

JIM CAREY'S LETTER, Davis CA, near Sacramento

Son of Laverna and Robert Carey, grandson of John (Frank's brother) and Lizzie (Amy's sister) Lindgren

Dear Everyone,

I had the good fortune and happy experience last spring in Madison, Wisconsin of meeting for the first time my second cousins Dick, Bruce, Steve, and Dave Lindgren, as well as my second cousins once and twice removed, respectively, Laura Garner and her son, Carson. Along with recent help and encouragement from Linnae Coss, this delightful occasion inspired me to join this Round Robin.

What a thrill for me, given I have had so many contacts with the Lindgren relatives. My mother LaVerna was the 9th child of Frank Lindgren's brother John Lindgren and Amy (Clara Naemi) Lindgren's sister Lizzie Johnson. As a young boy I had heard talk about Obed, Gilmore, Frank, Aunts Amy and Nellie. My second cousin Bob Selim (living in Somerville MA) was my mother's escort at my wedding in Boston in the late 1970s. And I met Rosalie (Johnson) Ortmeyer and Pauline Johnson when I came to northern California. Although I had put together a family genealogy 25-30 years ago, I still had only a weak sense of the Lindgren side of my heritage. By joining this Round Robin I feel on a path of personal discovery.

Childhood

No use for me trying to cover too much historical background — like everyone on this RR, it would take pages and pages. In a nutshell: I was born in 1947 as the second child of three (Barb and Kathy) of LaVerna (Lindgren) and Robert Carey (who died when I was 14 and mom was in her mid-40s). I grew up on our small farm in Iowa until I was 17, and moved to Ames with my mother and one sister after high school.

Military and early education

I was drafted to army infantry in late 1960s during the Vietnam War but ended up serving as a ranger instructor at U.S. Army Mountain Ranger Camp in northern Georgia. In 1973 I completed my B.S. degree at Iowa State in fisheries and wildlife biology (I was big into hunting, fishing and trapping on the farm) but went on to graduate school in entomology with guidance from Tom Brindley, LaVerna (Rohden) Brindley's husband, who was entomology professor at Iowa State (as noted by Dick Lindgren et al in their earlier RR letters).

PhD and family

In 1975 I enrolled for my PhD at UC Berkeley, finishing in 1980, including a one-year stint at Harvard as a visiting PhD student in population biology and genetics. It was in Boston that I met my first wife

(since divorced and re-married) with whom we had three children — Bryce, Ian and Meredith, the first two of whom are married with a total of 5 (grand) children.

Teaching

As of March 1 I finished my 40th year as a faculty in entomology here at the University of California, Davis, as both an instructor and a researcher. It has been a good run and retirement is on the horizon at 72 years old. Although I am still actively publishing and teaching, we'll see how much longer I can go, especially given the current pandemic situation.

Life today

My wife Patty and I thoroughly enjoy our lives in Davis – a progressive university town of around 60,000 residents and nearly 35,000 students. All my children live out-of-state – i.e., New York, North Carolina to Oregon. I am very much looking forward to reading and contributing to this RR letter.
