Location and dates of Frank and Amy Lindgren's farms, 1902 to 1915

I have found some more information in my files.

My father told me that Frank and Amy lived on the farm 1/2 miles west and 1 and 3/4 miles south of the Lanyon farm before they moved to the Anderson farm. It is in the same section and John Lindgren's farm. It seems that they moved to that farm right after they were married, and Amy never lived on the farm north of Harcourt where Frank was farming. My father's birth certificate shows a doctor from Paton, which makes a Harcourt residence unlikely. There were no cars until 1910.

Regina says that she went to two schools in Paton Township. The first one would have been at the north edge of John Lindgren's main farm. It is hard to tell when they bought the Anderson farm, but Regina says she moved in the third grade, which would have been about 1910. She also says that she skipped two grades when she moved, so it is hard to tell.

The abstract says that they bought the Lanyon farm in 1915. They were going to school 1/2 mile east and on mile south of the Lanyon farm when they lived on both of those farms. She calls it the Burgh school, so it must have been in the corner of the Gust Burgh farm. That farm is one mile south of the Lanyon farm and was the home J. Fred Burgh, a vice president of North Park.
